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# 1. WHAT IS REFERENCING?

Referencing is a **system** used in the **academic community** to **indicate** where ideas, theories, quotes, facts and any other evidence and information used in any research paper, **can be found**.

### 3. WHAT IS A REFERENCING STYLE?

- ⦿ A referencing style is not a writing style, but an **editorial style** that many sciences have adopted to **present written material** in the field with regard to certain norms.
- ⦿ **Editorial style** consists of **publisher guidelines** that ensure **clear** and **consistent presentation** of written material.

- ◎ **Editorial style** includes the following:
  - punctuation and abbreviations
  - construction of tables
  - selection of headings
  - citation of references
  - presentation of statistics, and
  - other elements that are a part of a manuscript

◎ **Editorial style** also includes information on all aspects of **formatting**; e.g.:

- paper size
- spacing, font type and size
- margins, page numbers
- italics and underlining
- title page
- page numbering

## 4. CHOOSING THE RIGHT STYLE OF REFERENCING

- ❑ Preferred referencing styles **vary** between **schools**, or even **courses**.
- ❑ There is **no better style** than other.
- ❑ Ask your **teacher** or **supervisor** for the required institutional **style**, or that adopted for any special type of course.

## 5. APA DOCUMENTATION STYLE

- ◎ APA style is the set of specific **formatting conventions** sanctioned by the **American Psychological Association (6<sup>th</sup> edition, 2010)**.
- ◎ The American Psychological Association (APA) guidelines are the most commonly used among the **social sciences, behavioral sciences, and education**.

- ⦿ In a **classroom** situation, the reader is usually the **teacher**, and part of a paper's **grade** is generally based on how well it **follows** the accepted **style**.
- ⦿ Students must pay careful attention to the referencing style.

## 6. TWO COMPONENTS OF APA

- **APA** style is characterised by two major components for referencing sources:
  - **In-text citations** (parenthetical) within the main text
  - **References** page at the end of the paper

# REMEMBER!!

- ⦿ The references should start on a new page.
- ⦿ The title of the page should be “References”.
- ⦿ If only **one** reference appears on the page, the title should be “Reference”.
- ⦿ Center the title “References” at the top of the page, do not bold or underline it.
- ⦿ References should be listed **alphabetically** (by the first listed author's last name) and **double-spaced**.
- ⦿ **Flush left** the first line of the entry and **indent** subsequent lines (hanging indent = 1.27 cm **or** 0.5 inch)
