Week Three: Stages of Writing _ Outlining/ Planning



Objectives

- Understanding outlining basics
- > Understanding the difference between main and minor ideas
- Eliminating irrelevant ideas

Last week, you learned how to brainstorm your ideas. This week, you will learn about outlining, an important process for planning paragraphs and other writing assignments. All outlines have the same basic functions.

- They order ideas, starting with big ideas (which become support points) and moving to related examples and specific details.
- > They group items that are related to one another.
- > They eliminate any items that do not fit together.
- > Take a look at the following outline, in which key features are noted.

Assigned topic	Write about your workplace		
main idea	Three serious problems make my workplace an unpleasant environment.		
support point 1	The leadership is poor. – shift leader plays favourites – manager is a bad communicator – I should be a manager – shift leader and manager don't help with customers		
support point 2	The staffing is inadequate. – only four workers on weekends – only one cashier – too many workers call in sick		
support point 3	There are serious personality problems. – manager is insensitive – older and younger employees argue – guys harass the girls – they should hire better people		

- The main idea responds to your assigned topic. It connects all the support points and examples that follow.
- The support points are based on the *big ideas* from clusters or lists, and they back up the main idea.
- > Related examples are grouped under each support point.
- Unrelated ideas are eliminated.




